Compassion - choosing to be with those who are suffering - is one of the core values here at **Crossroads**. As this quote indicates, we believe that it is manifested most purely through "a life together", a community. We strive each day to build a compassionate community that treats people with dignity and works to realize equity for all our neighbors. Such a goal can seem overwhelming, even on the best of days. Faced with the reality of as many as 150 men, women and children walking through our door each day in crisis, the burden of compassion can test even the most dedicated among us. Add the fact that a disproportionate number of our guests are from communities of color, and the hope for equity can begin to fade quickly.

But this is where community becomes the key. When we choose to come together across a diverse array of backgrounds and experiences, working toward a common goal, we begin to change the dismal reality of our neighbors suffering unjustly and unnecessarily in a prosperous society. This takes intentionality - a decision to take actions that invest in and empower those marginalized by systems and structures that primarily benefit those who created them. On one level, this means challenging those systems and structures and working for a more just social, economic and political reality. That is a lifelong work to which we must all commit. But on a more personal level it means joining those efforts that work to change the daily experience of those struggling just to survive.

That opportunity exists here at **Crossroads**. Both through giving of time in volunteering and in giving of finances, we can all be part of a community that doesn't just make a real difference for others but builds relationships that challenge and change us. In being with those who suffer, we gain as much - maybe more - than we give. We see it happen every day with the many individuals and groups who spend time volunteering and providing the resources that make the **Crossroads** community a place of hope and transformation.
